YPS member Sri Ranganath C won the accolade of Honorary Gold Photographer Ambassador of India for being the best entrant from our country in the recently judged Athens HPS Salon 2020 organized by the Hellenic Photographic Society, Greece. He started photography in 2016 when invited by his friend to join a photography tour to Masai Mara and Nakuru in Kenya. Sri Ranganath immediately agreed to join the tour to the 'Mecca of Wildlife Photography'. Having no prior knowledge of photography, he bought a crop frame camera and a 200-500mm lens with the help of the same friend. After an online course on photography, he went on this tour.

Later he upgraded the equipment, started visiting tiger sanctuaries across the country, went to a few birding places and started organizing the pictures taken. The turning point was the year 2019, which started with a visit to Mangaljodi in Odisha. Visits to Ranthambhore and Bandhavgarh national parks followed and a second visit to Kenya. He got many action sequences during these visits. On the insistence of his friends,



Sudheendra and Chetan, Sri Ranganath became a member of YPS and started participating in photography salons. He has won several awards and acceptances in national and international salons.

Sri Ranganath is an Orthopaedic Surgeon by profession. Distance running is his other passion and he has run over a dozen half-marathons in various cities of India.

Dr G Thomas

Mohammed Arfan Asif MPSA, EFIAP/p, ARPS, MICS, FICS, MIUP, c*Mol, Hon YPS

No. 50, Sri Ram Mandir Road in Basavanagudi, Bengaluru was the most famous address in the Indian photographic scenario for nearly five decades. Today you will not find that remarkable spacious cottage, which was known as the Head Quarters of the Federation of Indian Photography. The memories of those privileged days, frequenting this place and interacting with the man who shaped the destiny of photography in India are something, which time may never erode.

Discerning, electric and charismatic, Dr G Thomas, FPSA, FRPS, Hon FPSA, Hon FRPS, Hon FRPS, Hon FRPS, Hon FRPS, Hon FRPS, Hon PSI, Hon YPS steered the growth of Indian photography through 40 years of the last century as the secretary general of Federation of Indian Photography (FIP), which he founded. He transformed Indian photography into a national movement and placed it in the world map of photography.

An arbiter of good composition, he wove pictorial nuances in fine monochromes, most of which were landscapes and outdoor genre. His no-horizons-are-too-far-to-cross approach made him reach great heights. As a photo artist, physician, painter, writer, critique, administrator and mentor, he was most exemplary.

His masterpieces were created in the rural ambience of the places he travelled for his medical practice, which included Madras, Kanpur, Jaipur and Saurasthra region of Gujarat, before he settled down in Bengaluru in 1943.

Earlier to the founding of FIP, he was also founder of Mysore Photographic Society (MPS). Dr Thomas was appointed as continental representative for the Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique (FIAP – The International Federation of Photographic Art) in Asia and president of the Federation of Asian Photographic Art.

Dr Thomas was honoured by all the top photographic organizations of the world for his dedicated organizational efforts and excellence in photography. YPS had conferred on him its first ever honorary membership.

His 520 acceptances from 100 odd pictures with innumerable awards including the Saltorius Medal from Austria for pictorial photography and the FIAP Service Gold Medal reflect his consistent participation in international exhibitions. His one-man photography shows in Sweden, China, Sri Lanka and South Vietnam are not only personal achievements

but are considered as landmarks of Indian photography.

The 17th of April 1993 marked the end of a glorious chapter. 27 years have passed since. Fond memories of a personality, of an exemplary artist, of a relentless administrator, etched in memory live on. Dear Doc, you continue to inspire.

Here is a look at some exemplary works of Dr Thomas.

As the fog lifts

A picture that reflects the idealism of traditional pictorialism viz, tones, shapes, frame, repetitive patterns, balance of elements and leading lines. Fog has been used since time immemorial for isolating principal elements and subduing the distracting ones to near oblivion. The sensitive use of the chemical darkroom has established a vast range of tones from the very dark dense leaves in the foreground to pure white in the distance.

Dr Thomas has ensured the naturalness of the scenario without an orchestrated approach. The rustic ambience very romantically presented in this atmospheric image became a trend setter, rather an icon for future outdoor genre pictorial photographers.

Interrupted

A very different creation from one known more for landscapes and outdoor genre. This image presents 'Rembrandt Lighting', evident with the catch light at the 10'O clock position and that faint inverted triangle in the darker side of the face on the cheek.

Use of a low-key lighting approach for a young subject may have been a challenge. However, transition of the tonal variation within the face is quite gentle while in other areas it is quite abrupt. This is indicative of careful and studied thought process as well as the excellence in chemical darkroom skills.

The portrait intrinsically presents a near naturalness in a staged setting obvious with the position of the hand and the captivating glance.

Midday Recess

I have had the fortune of viewing a bromoil print of this image. This old technique, which essentially is an ink image replacing the silver captures the atmosphere with great advantage. It may not be easy to replicate this beautiful and nostalgic pictorial effect with a conventional print.

Apart from adding a texture screen, Dr Thomas emphasizes a very interesting compositional pattern of the two pairs of cattle with the two trees amidst a plain backdrop with cumulonimbus clouds. The entire canvas here has a cohesive and unified spatial arrangement justifying the elements used. This helps ensure that the viewer's journey within the image starts from the highlights in the foreground.

Kausani: A Paradise for Photographers

Across the sea of clouds

The sobriquet 'Switzerland of India', does little justice to Kausani for the mesmerizing vistas of the Himalayas it offers. It is a quaint little town nestled in the lap of Himalayas at a height of about 1890 meters (6200 ft) from sea level, in the state of Uttarakhand. From here one can see a 240 Km wide panoramic view of the Himalayas with many peaks such as Ghori Parvat, Nandaghunti, Trishul, Nanda Devi, Nanda Khat, Nanda Kot, Panchchuli and Chaukhamba. Naturally, Kausani was the ideal venue for the 6th Himalayan Landscape Photography Workshop, organized recently.

More than 35 participants from different parts of India attended the workshop and were guided by the mentors Sri Threesh Kapoor, Sri Gurdas Dua, Sri Anil Risal Singh and Sri H Satish. Slideshows by all the mentors were a visual treat of some stunning landscape images.

The wealth of information the mentors shared with regard to nuances of landscape photography including tips on composition, cameras and lenses, filters; especially the circular polarizing filters while shooting in the Himalayas and accessories was truly an eye opener for many of the participants.

Importance was given to actual shooting more than theory sessions. Participants just needed to step out of their rooms to make images of the mesmerizing Himalayan range. Freezing temperatures was no deterrent for the participants' enthusiasm. We woke up before sunrise to capture some beautiful images. The biting cold of early mornings were offset by the heartwarming views of the snow-clad Himalayan mountains bathing in the morning mist.

Though the rains scuttled the planned visit to Gwaldam, arrangements were made to visit the Anashakti ashram, Kausani market, nearby villages and the temple town of Baijnath. Mentors wholeheartedly and unhesitatingly shared their knowledge, which helped everybody to shoot not only landscapes but also pictorial images, portraits and street photos.

A live demonstration of food photography by Sri Gurdas Dua was very insightful and helpful for the participants to understand the steps and processes involved.

Some of the participants too were given an opportunity to present their images. A presentation by YPS member,

Srinath Narayan on star trails and Milky way photography made every viewer's jaws drop in awe. There is no doubt many of the participants were inspired to tread hitherto unknown paths and explore new genres of photography.

To conclude the workshop, a photography competition was organized and YPS members Sri Anantha Murthy, Smt Anitha Mysore, Sri Nandan Hegde and yours truly were amongst the top winners. Overall it was an amazing and memorable experience.

How to Reach Kausani

The nearest airport is the Indira Gandhi International airport in New Delhi. From New Delhi, take the New Delhi-Kathgodam Shatabdi express, the fastest of the three trains available to reach Kathgodam. A taxi ride of around five and a half hours from here takes you to Kausani. Many major places are well connected to Kausani by plying taxis and Uttarakhand Transport Corporation's bus services.

'The Buransh', venue of the workshop, is a wonderful resort to stay in. Fantastic hosts and excellent food to go along with beautiful vistas on offer makes this resort ideal for photographers. Home stays, hotels and other resorts are also available to cater to the needs of the tourists.

About Photography Salons

Salon is a French term, which literally translates to 'big hall', 'lounge', 'convention' etc. Royal Academy of Painting and Sculpture founded in 1648 in France held its first official art exhibition in 1667 when Louis XIV sponsored the exhibition. The salon derives its name from the fact that the exhibits were hung in the Salon d'Apollon of the Louvre Palace in Paris (Encyclopaedia Britannica). Thus a Photography Salon is an exhibition of photographic art held in a suitable place such as an art gallery, mainly meant for public viewing. World over, various photography clubs organise these salons wherein they invite entries from artists, which will be curated towards inclusion in the exhibition. Generally, these salons are held under the umbrella of federations such as Federation of Indian Photography (FIP), Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique (FIAP) and Photographic Society of America (PSA) as per set of rules to impart credibility and to ensure proper exhibition.

Why participate?

Though the choice of participation is very personal, I have tried to jot down some of the reasons for taking part in photography salons. They are

1) Exhibit across the globe: Say photo artists want to exhibit

- their works in a particular gallery abroad. Obviously, it involves considerable time and money, which they may not be able to afford. The other way to exhibit their works is to find a club from that country, which holds an exhibition in that gallery and submit their works by paying a nominal fee. The curated works will be exhibited.
- 2) Practice: Regular practice of an activity is one of the ways to become proficient in it. This is true with art of photography as well, especially so in case of amateur photographers. Photo salons offer the platform for healthy competition and practice of this art. By regular participation, one can definitely improve his/her skill and thus the confidence to take part in big contests like Sony World Photography Awards and DJ Memorial Photography Contest.
- 3) Networking: By participating in salons, artists can develop a network of like minded people from different parts of the world. They can share their works, explore others' works, discuss them and build a better understanding of art of photography and current trends.
- 4) Sense of Accomplishment: Photo artists can become famous by winning awards and acceptances regularly. These can be leveraged against photography distinctions bestowed upon by various federations. They may be invited to give talks or to judge salons/competitions.

PSA Who's Who

Photographic Society of America's "Who's Who" is a list of top exhibitors in each division/class of PSA, published annually. The list is derived out of the results of all the PSA recognised exhibitions held in that year. In addition to the alphabetical listing with total acceptances, the most successful exhibitors during the year, based on their Average Judging Scores achieved in a minimum number of judgings, are listed in a box displaying

the top exhibitors for each division/class. All PSA members who are among the top ten (in the boxes) receive a Who's Who certificate. In addition, those in the first, second, or third places in the boxes are invited to submit two images for inclusion in the "PSA Who's Who in Photography" publication. In the year 2019, following YPS members have made it to the list.

Street Photography had its formal origin somewhere in late 19th century although a long exposure street photograph was captured by Louis Daguerre in 1838, with a boot polisher and client at a street corner in France. After portable cameras came in 1960's, this genre got popularized.

As read in Wikipedia, street photography features unmediated chance encounters and random incidents in public places. Importance is for an object of interest in the public, where an exclusive perception created in the mind of an observer at a decisive or poignant moment is captured by the camera.

Here are some quotes from few world-class Street Photographers:



the picture is also thought provoking.



The journey to Pokhara, another beautiful town was followed by a trip to Sarangkot for sunrise view of the peaks of Annapurna and Macchapuchare. After a short flight to Jomsom, trekking to Kagbeni and Muktinath along Kali Gandaki river, she could photograph splendid vistas



of Lower Mustang valley. Smt Prema emphasized visiting these places required a permit. Visiting Marpha, a quaint little town, she travelled back with a stopover at Bandipur for few more images of panoramic Himalayas. The entire travel story was deeply engrossing with impressive photographs.

A Start to Astrophotography

On the Sunday of 10th May 2020, YPS members were taken on a journey into the heavenly world of Astrophotography by **Sri Srinath Narayan**, an experienced and knowledgeable photographer in the field. Sri Srinath, a mechanical engineer, has delved into different genres of photography from '80s. His passion for astrophotography was kindled in 1994-95.



Beginning the session, Sri Srinath hastened to clarify that astrophotography was not too technical as was thought of and anyone with a basic setup would be able to do it. He showed some photographs on star trails and milkyway detailing the situation and settings for each. He displayed various charts used for planning where and when to shoot the

various astronomical bodies and phenomena. He also informed the availability of different applications such as Photopills and Stellarium.

Planning, execution and post-processing are the three stages involved in astrophotography. Planning involves deciding the subject, time and location. The basic needs are a camera with manual control, intervalometer, non-CPU lens with wider aperture, a sturdy tripod, lots of memory cards and batteries, torch light and warm clothing.

Coming to execution, Sri Srinath shared few tips such as shooting in raw format, turning off vibration reduction and not raising the centre column of the tripod. He also gave guidance on focussing, shutter speed, ISO speed and white balance. Finally, proper post-processing of the images completes the process, he said. His short movie *Anthology of colours* shown at the end was the icing on the cake.

Portrait Insight

The third live webinar of YPS on Facebook was a talk 'Portrait Insight' by eminent photographer Sri A K Raju AFIAP, on Sunday,

the 17th May 2020. Sri Raju while pursuing his other interests such as martial arts and singing, was drawn to photography at quite an early age, mentored by his father Sri K N Ashwath Rao and uncle late Sri E Hanumantha Rao AFIAP, Hon YPS. Joining YPS in 1982, he served as programme director besides editing the YPS newsletter, all the while



following his passion for photographing nature, wildlife and portraits.


Sri Raju started the session explaining how, learning portraits with experimenting on lighting and exposure helps in other genres of photography also. He classified the session on various aspects such as Objective, Birth and evolution of portrait photography, Styles and Types of portraits, Rules, Lighting, Background and Facial study.

Beginning with the first ever photograph of the world taken in 1826, he showed many images while taking the audience along the evolution of portraits. Further he dwelt on types of portraits such as faces, busts and full-length images and styles of portraits such as candid, individual and group images.

Though there are no rules as such, one needs to understand accepted norms such as keeping camera at eye level and suitable foreground and background. Facial study is also important and distinct features such as narrow face or long ears have to be addressed properly. As regards the equipment, he suggested that an SLR camera and a lens in 80-135mm range would generally be suitable. At the end of the session, the audience were enlightened with the finer aspects of portrait photography.

Wildlife of Africa

A wonderful slide show of images from Africa, the exciting land of wildlife, was presented by **Sri Anantha Murthy** on this YPS webinar on Sunday, the 24th May 2020. Sri Anantha Murthy, working as a development officer in LIC of India, is a keen photographer of wildlife and birds. Following his passion for photography



Heliride to view animals is a thrilling adventure but photographing is quite a challenge. However, Sri Anantha Murthy was able to capture some stunning images of the aerial view of the wildlife. Visiting the tribal village of Masai was an added attraction.

With his impressive collection of images and detailed narration, Sri Anantha Murthy took the audience on a virtual tour of Africa.

from 2012, Sri Anantha Murthy has visited most of the states in India and has also visited Sri Lanka, Bhutan, Kenya, Botswana, Zambia, Ecuador and USA.

Sri Anantha Murthy began the show with a map of Africa highlighting the wildlife areas visited during his travels. Being a birder, he shared images of birds to begin with followed by the 'Big Five'. The images of lions, lionesses with cubs and cheetahs were followed by the images of huge elephants of Amboseli. The photographs clicked at Samburu of giraffe, Black rhino, Impala and Secretary bird, as well as the views of superb sunrise and sunset were simply spell binding.

Moving on to Okavango delta and Lake Nakuru in Botswana, Sri Anantha Murthy displayed exciting images of camping in wilderness along with a variety of wildlife from Dik-dik, the smallest antelope to Goliath Heron, the largest heron. A moon light shot of elephants and Grey crowned crane were awesome.

Evocative Wildlife Photography

The 5th webinar of YPS for May 2020 was held on Sunday, the 31st. We had a guest speaker from Hyderabad, **Sri Masood Hussain** AFIAP, a wildlife and bird photographer. Sri Masood began the session explaining the concept of 'Evocative wildlife photography' wherein an element of thought process and creativity have to go into the images. That was what he did in his



first solo exhibition of wildlife photographs, 'Meraki', connecting people with nature. He displayed some unique photographs such as the Pied Kingfisher taking off, insect on a viper's head and a peacock in flight, which won him the 'Best Bird Photographer Award'.

His image of a Peregrine falcon feeding on pigeon got Natural Capital Award in 2017. Sri Masood emphasized these images could be made by being at the right place at the right time and there was no creativity.

For evocative photography one can photograph even common species like deer, cormorant or a squirrel but with a thought process and creativity. A different approach like shooting against light or using the curves and patterns advantageously were a few of the tips he gave. The photographs of a deer stretching up to leaves, a darter preening in closeup and

inverted reflection of deer drinking water were indeed evocative.

The last few photographs of his 'Art from the heART' series depicted black and white photographs such as the profile of a gaur, close-up of elephant trunk and a tiger.
